PRESIDENT'S REPORT

If the strength of a club is measured by the number of pennants and awards won by its teams or players, then the 1979/80 season was not an obvious success.

However, I firmly believe that the charter of this club is to foster and service the needs of both the game and those in our district who wish to participate. It is this arena that we are going from strength to strength.

Eight teams represented the club in the W.A.C.A. Competition last year. Four senior pennant teams, three under sixteen teams and one under fourteen team.

1979-80 saw the introduction of our fifth and sixth grade teams. Although they are an integral part of the club, they had to play in the Suburban Turf Association, due to lack of fixtures for such teams in the W.A.C.A. competition.

Our junior council fielded 32 teams in our district competition last season. It was from these teams that the U/14 and U/16 sides were selected to represent the club in the W.A.C.A. Junior Competition.

To the Chairman of the club's Junior Council, Mr Waldo Turner, and the delegates to the council, I extend my greatful thanks for their contribution to the club. I am delighted with the lines of communication that have been established between the two bodies and will endeavour to see them strengthened in the years to come.

Becuase of the increasing numbers of playing members, the committee and I have been aware of the necessity to secure more grounds. Last season saw the return of club teams to Rosalie Park. Although Rosalie had been out of commission for a number of years, the Subiaco Council spent a great deal of time and expense rejuvenating the wickets to A Grade standard.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT CONTINUED

The 1980-81 season should bare the fruits of the Council's labour and the club will have at its disposal three major grounds, Floreat Oval, Rosalie Park and Alderbury Street.

The wicket at Floreat oval proved disappointing last season, with only one A Grade game being played there. Our efforts in closing the oval during the 1978-79 season to allow the pitches to recover was of little or no avail. However, I have been assured by officers of the Perth City Council that signs of rejuvenation are encouraging and we should be able to play a full set of fixtures on the oval next year.

In an effort to secure the financial future of the club, the committee has established an investment fund. Members were solicited and a sum of \$745.00 has been invested at an attractive rate of interest. It is the intention of the committee to expand this amount each year by commitie 10% of all money raised by the club to the fund. The principal will never be expended. The interest earnt by the fund will be returned to the club's current account each year.

The task of financing the day to day needs of a club of our size becomes more of a challenge each year.

We have been more than fortunate to have the sponsorship of Mr George Sassella and his staff at the Hotel Floreat and the Jolly Frog restaurant Mr Sassella's organisation has provided not only financial sponsorship, but moral support to the members of the club. It is in appreciation of this support that we have invited Mr Sassella to accept the position of Patron of the club for the coming season.

January saw a squad of senior players and members of the committee travel to Collie under the sponsorship of the Griffin Coal Mining Company. Seventy-one juniors in the Collie district attended a morning coaching clinic, followed by a match against a combined Collie senior side from the Collie Cricket Association.

We are indebted to the Griffin Coal Mining Company for this sponsorship and the Collie Cricket Association for their fellowship.

My thanks go to those who worked so hard to achieve the off field club spirit. Although our home ground facilities are primitive compared to those of other clubs, it was pleasing to see the number of members who participated in the after match socials.

I would like to add my congratulations to Kim Hughes and Graeme Porter who represented Australia, and to Terry Alderman and Glen Hughes who represented us in the W.A. Sheffield Shield Team. Also Trevor Sanders and Brad Lohore who gained selection in the State schoolboys team last year. Well done!

My thanks go to the members of the committee who have supported me so well during the year. It's because of their efforts and the work of previous committees we now have the strength in numbers and the depth of talent in our young players to achieve club championship status.

In closing, I charge the captains of the clubs teams with the responsibility of not only guiding the playing skills of players, but also to conduct themselves with the dignity that this club and the great game of cricket demands.

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CAPTAINS REPORTS

FIRST GRADE:

In my opinion, no team within the club is more or less important than another, and ALL teams should strive equally hard to help the club attain its overall objectives. Therefore, I was pleased that the team of which I was captain was able to make a substantial contribution throughout the season to the club's record.

In the course of the pennant season, the first team won 9 games, lost 3, and drew the remaining game which was abandoned due to rain with Subiaco-Floreat in a favourable position. Thus we won a place in the final four, and a berth in the semi-finals. In due course we were eliminated from the finals by eventual premiers, Melville.

We were at full strength for the semi-final, and in my opinion, that made us a very good side. Melville at the moment are possibly one of the best first grade sides that have been seen for several seasons and thus the stage was set for a good contest. Unfortunately, Melville played with a touch of brilliance that we could not match. It is the nature of pennant finals that a slight difference in ability on the day is usually reflected in a very big difference in the final scores.

In getting to the pennant finals, I felt we played very close to our full potential for most of the qualifying games. It should be noted that for most of the season we were without 3 and sometimes 4 first class players. I am proud of the fact that in all pennant games we were at all times professional and competitive. Our three losses were by relatively small margins. We were involved in several very close, "pressure" games, all of which we won. I think it reflects great credit on all those who played first grade that we were so competitive in pennant games.

FIRST GRADE

Therefore, I found our results in the limited overs competition (Toyota League) a great disappointment.

Due to our lack of success over the last couple of seasons, I feel that a poor attitude was developed to these games. I found this in marked contrast to the very professional approach that prevailed in pennant games. I urge all first team members to think very hard about this over the off season because I feel continued failure in this competition would be intolerable.

In terms of individual performances, I would first of all note the efforts of our state representative. In many clubs, state players are seen to be merely "going through the motions" at grade level, but Subiaco-Floreat was magnificently served by four first class palyers who gave unsparingly for the club, both on the field, and in terms of time, effort and interest off the field. The amount that these players put back into the club should not be taken for granted, and I for one would like to put on record my thanks to Kim, Glenn , Terry and Graham.

The devlopment of young players is crucial if a club hopes for continuing success. This season saw Steve Mulhall, Brian Raven and Geoff Hann established as regular first team players. Warren Ralph, Kim Harris and John Davies were other young players who contributed significantly at various times, and who should again compete for a place in the side next season.

Unfortunately, we only had the services of Paul Nicholls for the first half of the year. When Paul left to go to Albany, he was the leading scorer in the competition, and he has proved irreplacable.

I have left until last mention of our best two players. Throughout the season, the efforts of Ian King and Jim Hubble assumed heroic proportions. Jim was our best and most consistent batsman, winning at least two games "off his own bat" after they had appeared irrevocably lost. He also took many vital catches and wickets.

FIRST GRADE

Ian dominated our bowling, maintaining unfailing line, length and hostility, against all batsmen, in all conditions. He took a very large number of wickets himself, and was responsible for many others which fell to the bowler fortunate enough to be on at the other end.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the players for their efforts this season. No captain can ever have received better support than that which I obtained this year. I look forward to next season in the hope that we can repeat our success in pennant games, and put up a much better effort in the one day competition.

SECOND GRADE:

This season, the second grade team performed creditably and although narrowly failing to make the finals, had developed into a potent force by the end of the season.

Initially, the team lacked experience in the high batting order but young players such as Fitzgerald, Wright and Cameron developed into performers with a big potential for the future.

I think it would be fair to say that the reason why the team lost only three games for the year was the skill of its bowling attack which was probably the best second grade attack in the past decade. Ralph, Raven and Christensen took over 100 wickets between them and Neil Bolton added very good support. Sanders in the latter part of the season also showed considerable ability. The average opposition first innings score was only 142 runs.

The team's failure to make the final four can be attributed to a lack of consistent run scorers and batsmen with the ability to remain at the crease for long periods.

SECOND GRADE

Our average first innings score was only 173 and its was this failure to amass bonus points that ultimately proved costly. It was left on many occasions for the experienced middleorder batsmen such as Alan Bolton and Reg Statham to graft runs for victory rather than amass bonus points.

In retrospect however, I must say that by season's end the team was very efficient. The younger players had matured, the team spirit was high and the future of the club looks rosy with the development of such supporting strength in the grade.

THIRD GRADE:

After winning the premiership last season this team started with only three players remaining from that side. As a result, it took until January to win their first match.

From that time they won 4 out of their next 6 games including one outright. Had the games that were close -(2 runs to Perth, 1 wicket to Midlands and 10 runs to North Perth) been won we would have again been playing in the finals. Vice-Captain John Caldow was a model of consistency in the batting.

Opening, he batted for over 100 minutes on no less than 8 occassions. John Davies showed his depth of experience by scoring a century and other fine innings. Dennis Medley and Greg Burgess also made valuable contributions. The bowling was led by the 'old man' David Phillips, taking 30 wickets at a rate of 9.9. John Mazza was a great improver and at times was brilliant. Trevor Sanders was rewarded for his bowling by finishing the season in seconds.

Both Brad Lohoar and Trevor Sanders represented the club in the State U/19 touring side.

THIRD GRADE

This was a very young and inexperienced side, whose batting, bowling and fielding was haphazard early in the season. From the halfway mark, through self-discipline and practise, these players earned the respect and admiration of the opposition to finish a very powerful third grade side who know how to win.

FOURTH GRADE:

The 1979/80 season was one of two halves for the fourth grade side. In the first six matches the side recorded only two wins. The losses included one against the bottom side and another against Wanneroo No.2. This part of the season was highlighted by a lack of players.

Six wins from seven matches is the story of the second half of the season. These wins included easy victories against three of the eventual finalists. This however, was not enough to compensate for the poor start to the season and lift us into the four.

Throughout the season the team had a strong bowling attack backed up by excellent fielding, except for the last two matches. Too often, however, low order batsmen were able to stick around and add runs where their top order team-mates had failed. This highlighted a lack of concentration by the team.

Batting during the season was definitely in two halves. Early season performances were very poor but in each of the last seven matches, the side scored in excess of two hundred runs. This included a score of 6/350 in 70 overs against Wanneroo No.1. The talents of Larry King, Steve Wright and Wayne Hicks, with consistent support from other members of the team were the main reasons for the improved performances.

FOURTH GRADE

No summary of the season would be complete without mention of two special highlights. The first is the running between wickets of Tony Bamford and Phil Haydon as they hammered their way to a match-winning 56 run partnership against Perth. Casual is the only way to describe Tony's running. Second is the performance of our two wicket-keepers for the season, neither of whom had kept wickets before the season. Denis Medley who's unique technique enabled him to effect six catches and one stumping in an innings, and Vaughan Veryard who performed as if he had been born with the gloves on (his feet).

Those who saw Vaughan's two stumpings in the last match will no doubt remember them for a long time to come.

My thanks go to all 35 players used during the season, they all put in a good effort. It was an enjoyable season with plenty of promising signs for the future.

FIFTH GRADE:

1979/80 was not a good year for the fifths as far as winning games was concerned, being victorious on only 4 occassions.

After promotion to 4th grade suburban turf, the side started the season well with an unbeaten century by Stephen Jones, however, this standard of batting was not achieved in many other matches. Rick Crosara won the batting averages with 268 runs at 26.8, including scores of 83 (3 6's, 8 4's), 46 and 42.

Other performances of note were Julian Clowes' 82 (in his first game for the club), Steve Sheridan's 62, and Barry Wilson's effort of 53NO. Rod Pullen also made scores of 46 and 41.

FIFTH GRADE

The bowling honours went to Julian Clowes with 27 wickets at 14.19 from 144 overs. Rick Crosara took 17 wickets at 17.41, whilst Matt Clifton and Tim Worner weighed in with 13 and 10 wickets respectively. Bruce Gillam was finally given a chance at bowling and showed his potential by taking 13 wickets at 20.69, including 7/82 and 4/59.

Philip Bailey again proved his worth behind the stumps, taking 15 catches although he faces tough competition for the job next season from Rod Pullin (3 catches in the last game)!

Attendance at training was a problem for members of the side, with work and study commitments taking priority. An unfortunate consequence of this was a lower standard of fielding than was desirable. It is hoped that this problem will be alleviated next season, leading to a more consistent team effort from the fifths in 1980/81.

SIXTH GRADE:

The season 1979/80 is the first time that the club has fielded a sixth's side. The team, consisting for most of the season largely of players who had never competed in club cricket, finished fifth on the ladder. We were in the four all season only to be edged out in the last qualifying round by the small margin of l_2 points.

We began the season well by defeating Secondary Teacher's College outright. We repeated this performance against the same team later in the season, this time in a one day match - the only team in the grade to accomplish this.

As late as the record last qualifying round we led by a comfortable margin, but we were defeated in both these matches by the teams that stood one and two on the table, John XXIII Old Boys and Whitfords respectively, to be overhauled at the post.

SIXTH GRADE

Individual performances in the team were top class. Graham Tate took 78 wickets at 8.44, a performance that gives him a great chance of taking out the averages for the competition, Ian McCann was easily the fastest bowler in the competition and the bowler with the worst luck.

On the batting side, Ian Porter thrashed the opposition all over the ground given the slightest opportunity, amassing 190 runs in nine innings for seven times out, and Johann Sereviratine displayed excellent technique to finish with 278 runs, at an average of slightly less than twenty. Observation of other batsmen in the grade by myself, umpires and other players in opposing teams revealed the general consensus that he was possibly the best and certainly the most elegant player in the grade.

It should be noticed that both he and Graham Tate refused promotion to the fifths or even the fourths, displaying admirable loyalty and team spirit.
